On January 16th, we commemorate and honor the life, legacy, and impact of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

At EAC Network, we hope to continue his legacy through our programs that provide vital services and access to resources to the underserved and vulnerable populations in Suffolk, Nassau, New York City, and Rockland County.

Dr. King Jr. said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, 'What are you doing for others?"

EAC Network has more than 109 programs serving 65,000 children, adults, seniors, and families throughout Long Island, NYC, and Rockland County.

Among them are our Alternatives to Incarceration Programs, the Health Home Program, the New Path Treatment Center, Suffolk County Children's Center at Cohalan Court, Safe Harbor, Alternatives for Youth. Community Reentry Assistance Network (CRAN), Senior and Nutrition Programs, Enhanced Employment Initiatives, and the Transitional Case Management Program.

National Human Trafficking Awareness Month

The human trafficking and sexual exploitation of Suffolk's children is rising at an alarming rate. EAC Network's Safe Harbour Program advocates for and supports children that have been, or are at risk of being, sexually exploited in Suffolk County. Our goal is to provide the education, skills, and support to protect children from being trafficked and sexually exploited.

EAC Safe Harbour is hosting a Human Trafficking Conference on January 25th at the Suffolk County Bar Association.

Any minor who has engaged in sexual acts for a fee or other promised payment (drugs, alcohol, other), loitered or solicited for sexual acts, or has been physically assaulted, threatened, or otherwise coerced into performing sexual acts is a sexually exploited child. All youth are at risk of being exploited/trafficked, yet there exist certain populations with higher risk. These groups include:
